About the speakers

Rolf DIETMAR is the Programme Director of the Sino-German Cooperation Programme “Environment-oriented Enterprise Consultancy Zhejiang”, which focuses on building up a model hazardous waste management system, promoting eco-efficient production and fostering corporate social responsibility, by the Deutsche Gesellschaft fuer Technische Zusammenarbeit (GTZ). Since 2005, he has been active in business development for GTZ International Services in the field of “Sustainable Industry Parks” and initiator of a business to establish a “Sino-German University for the Environment”.

DING Fuyun is an expert in the social compliance field in China, with a specialization in occupational health and safety. He has over a decade of experience in social audits, factory training, and so on.

Lars DOEMER is the General Manager of Global Sustainable Management (GSM) Asia. GSM is a private company founded in 2003 as subsidiary of a German organisation. It offers holistic and sustainable solutions for the assurance of company—specific standards in the areas of environment, social responsibility and quality. Before joining the GSM, Lars was the Key Account Manager of TÜV Rheinland, ShenZhen.

Stephen FROST is one of the founders and a director of CSR Asia. He is also an assistant professor at the Department of Asian and International Studies at the City University of Hong Kong. His core competencies include Asian labour law, occupational health and safety standards, and labour issues and standards in supply chains in Asia. His publications are widely published on labour standards, auditing, CSR in supply chains, and has worked with numerous companies on key supply chain issues in Asia. He is a co-editor of the Asia-Pacific Labour Law Review: Workers' Rights for the New Century, (AMRC, 2003). He holds a PhD in Asian Studies from Murdoch University in Australia.

LI Tao is the director of Cultural Communication Center for Facilitators (CCCCF) and external consultants or directors for many international and domestic NGOs and academic institutes. He worked previously as a reporter of China Women Newspaper; the chief editor of Rural Women; the program director, vice secretary-general of Cultural Development Center for Rural Women. Started at 1996, Li Tao set up classes for migrant workers in Beijing, worked with Home for Female Migrant Workers, in charge of the research on female migrant workers' marriage, migration to cities and return to countries of female migrant workers, migrant workers' occupational health and safety, public policy on migrant workers assessment, etc. Mr. Li took the charge of 3-year rebuild and community development after disaster project, organized seminars on migrant worker occupational health and safety, the reform and creative service public policy on migrant workers, etc. He has publications Distance Between the Cities and You, Dagong Times, Victims at work, Migration and Integration, Migrant Workers—Fluid on the Margin, etc. Mr. Li was the chief director of Female Migrant Workers Magazine in 2002 and founded the Cultural Communication Center for Facilitators (CCCCF) in 2003.

Belinda LIU, has been engaged in labour service work for four years; now is working for China Labor Support Network (CLSN), stationed at its Guangzhou centre ,which is named as “occupational health resources centre” (OHRC), and is responsible for Disney's helpline project and other relevant factory trainings.

Cathy LIU Chenyan is the Senior Project Manager of CSR Asia based in Shenzhen, China, focusing on research on CSR related issues in Asia, especially mainland China, organizing supply chain events, training and specific projects in the mainland and is currently involving in an InWent-funded private-public partnership factory training program for the Chinese apparel supply chain in partnership with TÜV Rheinland (Shenzhen) and labour relationship research in the automotive sector in China. Chenyan has been named a CSR guest researcher by the Chinese Association of Productivity Science (CAPS). Chenyan was previously employed in a mainland NGO dealing with labour. She holds a bachelors degree in Economics (majoring in Statistics) and MSc. Finance.

Sherin LIN is the Manager of Education and Consulting, TÜV Rheinland (Shenzhen) Co., Ltd. She devotes her efforts in developing and promoting education and consulting programs covering CSR, human resource management, environment and safety, quality and productivity, logistics and supply chain. She is one of the initiators of FIT5 Project and project manager of HRMS program. Since many years TÜV has been working together with organizations like Shenzhen government to enhance CSR awareness and implementation in enterprises. Before joining TÜV in 2003, she studied in Germany and worked for Stuttgart Economic Development Corporation in Sino-German environment projects.

About the speakers

Karen LO works for promoting occupational health and provides direct service and training on employees' development, occupational rehabilitation, rehabilitation counseling for the past ten years. She contributed her expertise on occupational safety and health to the projects by establishing resource center in Guangzhou on promoting occupational health and occupational rehabilitation in China. She had six years working experience on OSH promotion and had solid training experience on different topics of OSH. She conducted risk assessment and safety management consultant projects for the companies and became editor for publishing books in relating to OSH in Chinese. Karen currently is the Centre Manager of the Hong Kong Workers' Health Centre and is the Managing Director of the Guangdong Occupational Health and Occupational Rehabilitation Resource Centre (OHOR).

Martin MA works with Social Accountability International (SAI) as its China Program Director. SAI is the standard setting agency of SA8000, a worldwide workplace standard. In the past 5 years, Martin's major responsibilities at SAI include: Managing SAI programs in China, including training, public education, networking and program development. Martin is also a member of SAI's research team, he was closely involved with researching & revising the SA8000 Guidance Document. Since 2006, Martin has been the coordinator for the Solidaridad/SAI joint project to expand the Made-By model to China. The Made-By model aims to help textile/garment industries to incorporate in their operation the concepts of organic cotton, fair-trade, and responsible working conditions.

Liyan SUN is working as a Executive Researcher for MISUZU Sustainability Research Institute Co.,Ltd.. MISUZU Sustainability Research Institute Co.,Ltd. is a 100% subsidiary of MISUZU Audit Corporation, which is an international professional accounting firm and a network firm of PricewaterhouseCoopers in Japan. She joined Misuzu five years ago, and her job responsibilities include providing the Japanese company with the Assurance Engagement of Environmental Report, Sustainability Report and CSR Report; doing research in the field of Chinese Environmental Law, Labor Law and Regulations, monitoring Chinese Production Suppliers (who provide for Japanese Apparel Companies) for Code of Conduct as well as consulting China's labor issues, and performing gap analysis based on SA8000 on Japanese affiliated company in China.

Kalina TSANG is the Policy Officer of Oxfam Hong Kong. She works in the Policy and Public Education Unit and specializes in private sector engagement, labour standards and poverty issues. Her team responsible for the Make Trade Fair – Labour Campaign, which aims at raising the awareness of companies and the public on labour standards, supply chain and ethical consumption issues. Oxfam Hong Kong released the research report “Turning the Garment Industry Inside Out – Purchasing Practices and Workers' Lives”, “Resource Kit on Corporate Social Responsibility for Sustainable and Equitable Development” and two books on labours including “Photo Voices – Shenzhen Workers Speak” and “Trading Away Our Rights – Purchasing Practices of the Global Supply and Workers' Lives” in 2004. Since then, Oxfam Hong Kong works to improve labour standards in the supply chain and believes changes in purchasing practices, public disclosure as well as improved practices of corporate social responsibility by garment companies could benefit workers and contribute to our ultimate goal of reducing poverty.

Kitty WEI has been working for the Gloss Mind Apparel (Hong Kong) Co. Ltd as a Compliance Manager and Enterprise Planning Assistant Manager of Enterprise Planning Department since 2004. Kitty has rich experiences in social compliance and working with brands and NGOs.

Jochen WEIKERT is project manager in the *Sustainable Business Development* Division and Theme Manager *Sustainability in Businesses* of InWEnt - Capacity Building International in Bonn, Germany. Jochen Weikert studied development and political sociology, development economics and history at the Technical University Darmstadt and the Free University Berlin. He holds a diploma degree in sociology and did post-graduate studies in development politics at the German Development Institute (DIE-GDI) in Bonn. Before joining InWEnt in 2004, he specialized in issues of Corporate Social Responsibility and worked for the Carl-Duisberg Society (Berlin), the University of Witten/Herdecke and the Regional Institute of Environmental Technology (Singapore).

Richard WELFORD is one of the founders and a director of CSR Asia. He is also a professor at the University of Hong Kong and a director of ERP Environment, a UK-based publisher. Richard has considerable expertise in international business, environmental management and corporate social responsibility. He has been working with businesses in these areas for 20 years. He has written 15 books and over 100 articles relating to globalization, international business, environmental management, human rights and social responsibility. He has carried out a number of surveys on corporate social responsibility and sustainable development across the world making him one of the few people to be able to evaluate exactly the state of play with regard to Asia.

Transport

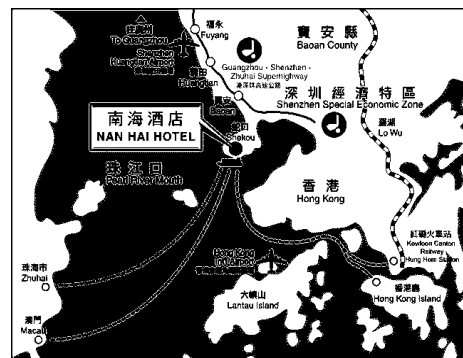
